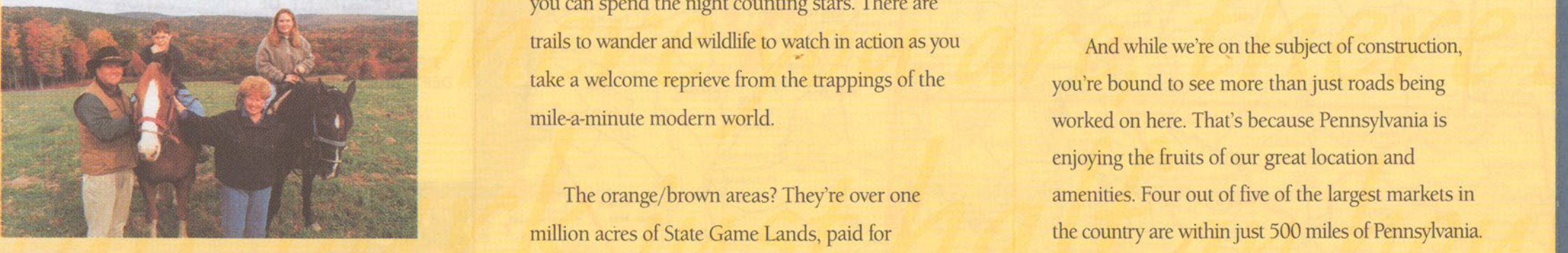

Pennsylvania Memories last a lifetime.

Just a glance at this map and one thing jumps out at you -- with all these roads, there must be a lot of places people want to go in this state.

And who can blame them?

Just down the road, you're likely to find a scenic overlook swirling with fresh mountain air. A roller coaster that will knock the wind right out of you. A baseball game that will leave you cheering your lungs out. Or a battlefield whose story will leave you breathless.

To cross Pennsylvania is to travel through 300 years of American history.

These roads climb mountains, wind through cities, weave through forests and cross the centuries. They lead back to the Revolution (or as they call it at the US Army War College in Carlisle, "The War for Independence"). To the front door of Independence Hall. To the Brandywine battlefield or the spot where Washington launched his Delaware crossing.

To forts named Roberdeau, Necessity, Pitt and Bedford, some of which predate the Revolution. And they lead you to some of America's most hallowed ground -- the battlefield at Gettysburg, where a still-young nation fought for its very life.

There are roads here that beckon you to pull over, step out and stretch your legs.

See all the green areas on the map? Those are our abundant state forests, state parks and national forest land. We think some of the prettiest land in the world. There, you'll find streams and lakes teeming with fish, 7000 family campsites and 300 cabins where you can spend the night counting stars. There are trails to wander and wildlife to watch in action as you take a welcome reprieve from the trappings of the mile-a-minute modern world.

The orange/brown areas? They're over one million acres of State Game Lands, paid for

and preserved by hunters, and open to absolutely everyone for virtually every outdoor pursuit imaginable, from kicking the brush for grouse to cross-country skiing.

Pull off at a scenic overlook. Watch streams and farms, villages and woodlands roll on to the end of the Earth.

All of that blue you see is our many, many waterways. Natural and man-made lakes, wild and leisured rivers, mountain creeks and streams. There are over 54,000 miles of rivers and streams here and 2,500 lakes. And almost all of them are populated by more fish than you can shake a stick at. Trout, bass, pike, muskies, pan fish, perch, shad, walleyes... hope you've got your rod back there.

But these roads also lead you out of the woods and into the non-stop excitement of great American cities like Philadelphia and Pittsburgh. Hop off the belways and parlayways and you'll discover gleaming downtowns. Catch a play or the stirring

performance of a world-class symphony. Wander (and wonder) through magnificent museums. Or enjoy the nighttime until the sun comes up.

Of course, we ask you to mind our speed limits, but if you feel the need to go as fast as you possibly can, pull off into one of our many ski areas. You can get up a head of steam there that will get your heart up into the 100 mile-a-minute range. Or drop to some whitewater in the Youghiogheny or Lehigh rivers. They'll fulfill your need for speed in a hurry. So will some of the world's fastest, wildest roller coasters in the many amusement parks across the Commonwealth.

And we're not talking cookie-cutter parks here either. Each one is one-of-a-kind with its own unique thrills and themes.

A medieval castle. Noah's Ark. Endless acres of grape arbors. These are just a few of the surprises.

Some of our more popular roads aren't even printed here. Yet millions of people cheer those who travel them. Like the road to the major leagues that runs through minor league baseball havens of Altoona, Erie, Harrisburg, Johnstown, Reading, Scranton/Wilkes-Barre and Williamsport. Those roads tend to end up in Pirates and Phillies territory, where they intersect the road to the World Series. Then there are the roads that lead to the Super Bowl and Stanley Cup that our Steelers and Eagles, Penguins and Flyers hope to travel.

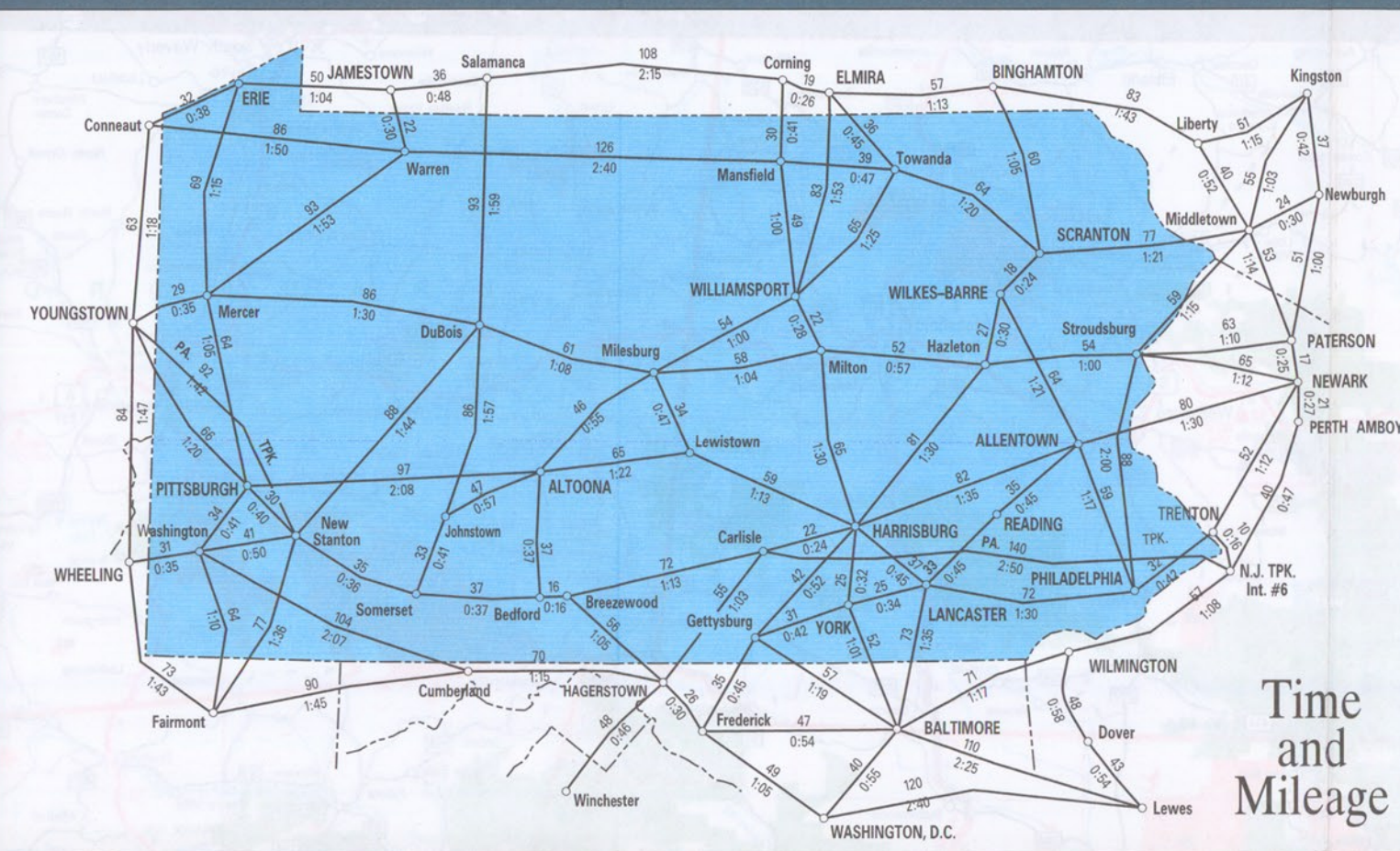
As you might expect, it takes a lot of work to take care of all these roads. So along the way, you might encounter some orange cones and barrels telling you that our highway workers are out there smoothing things over. Please be careful and note our construction work zone speed limits. They may slow you down a little, but with all there is to see along the way, that's not such a bad thing.

And while we're on the subject of construction, you're bound to see more than just roads being worked on here. That's because Pennsylvania is enjoying the fruits of our great location and amenities. Four out of five of the largest markets in the country are within just 500 miles of Pennsylvania.
